

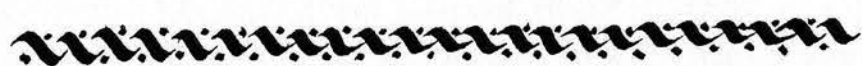

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A NOTE ON THE BASIC KNOCKALLA PEDIGREE

The pre-World War II breeding of Setters basically white with red patches comes through to the present day dogs along a very limited number of paths. I have explained elsewhere how it is that WAYDOWN SANDY, behind the best known Irish field trial breeding, provides one such path. He is repeated a good many times in some pedigrees. The purpose of this note is to draw attention to another group of sources of "the real thing".

CHARLAVILLE BEAUTY, a registered bitch behind the WINNOWING Setters, was a full sister of RUANE'S RUSTY who was the sire of Mr. & Mrs. Cuddy's GAYE OF KNOCKALLA, who was bred by Mr. W. Gaynor in 1970 and is behind all the MEUDON and many other recent pedigrees. This BEAUTY and RUSTY were sired by a red with white called FINN (by WAYDOWN SANDY out of Irish F.T.Ch. RAHARD BELLE) out of a white and red bitch SHERRY SECOND. SHERRY SECOND was by a white and red dog SHOT out of a white and red bitch SHERRY FIRST. These two were brother and sister and another full brother was WHISKEY FIRST, the sire of GAYNOR'S DUCHESS, who was the dam of the already mentioned GAYE OF KNOCKALLA. The trio SHOT, SHERRY FIRST and WHISKEY FIRST were all, like the SHOT who sired WAYDOWN SANDY (and I am not sure if this was not the same SHOT), by JEREMY of KNOCKALLA out of FELICITY OF KNOCKALLA.

There may be other connections with this pair as well, because it is not possible on the information at present available to me to trace some lines in some present day pedigrees back sufficiently far to preclude the possibility. They are clearly a very important pair. It is noteworthy in the pedigrees that follow that both of them are largely of white and red breeding, with just a few red outcrosses - the reverse of what has been the case with some more recent breeding before regulations began to get in the way.

Knockalla incidentally is a name that comes from County Donegal in the N.W. of Ireland and I think Mr. & Mrs. Cuddy were in that part of the world before they moved to County Cork.

Notes:-

1. Where colour is not stated in these pedigrees the Setter is believed to have been white with red patches i.e. a white and red or what is officially now a red and white.
2. There is an earlier dog of this name in British K.C. records born 1925. Rev. Huston seems to have bred a number of Brians, one, BRIAN OF BALMAGLAVE in the B.K.C. register, was born in 1937.
3. LEFT OF BALLYNAHINCH, a field trial award winner, was by LORD DECIDER, who is well illustrated in Mrs. Redlich's book.
4. This JUDITH is also illustrated in Mrs. Redlich's book.
5. MATILDA LASS is the B.K.C. register name for RORY MOR'S dam. In some pedigrees she is given as BENTHAM PRIDE which may be the I.K.C. name for the same bitch. Both are given the same RAVENHILL parents.
6. BOROUGHBURY VARI, of whom photographs survive, was an older sister (1945) of DIANA OF KNOCKALLA.

ALL THOSE PUPPIES!

When you have been closely involved with "Reds" for more than 12 years and totally captivated by them, are Red and Whites just other Irish Setters? Red and Whites are DIFFERENT, not better or worse, but as different as is an English or a Gordon. All four breeds are Setters, with certain similarities, but they even start off differently.

Belle (COPPERMOOR SCARLET CHARMER) was six months old when Pebble (ALLANAH OF SHANNONLEE) arrived on our scene. They are extremely good friends, they sleep together and are devoted to each other. When Pebble was two and Belle two and a half we decided to breed from them. Of course they came into season together and were mated within a few days of each other.

The pregnancies were uneventful, but the whelpings were significantly different. Belle's litter came quietly, methodically, each pup fat and lusty and dealt with by Belle as though she had had dozens of puppies before. In four hours she whelped 13 puppies, polished them well, snuggled them to her and went to sleep.

Pebble's puppies were born two days later. I think she felt that, if she thought about something else, it would all go away, because she did NOT want puppies after all. She never really got into any kind of rhythm, but did a lot of squeaking and shooting about the whelping box. Each puppy was born almost buried in its own placenta. Pebble shut her eyes, hoping it would disappear. I had to work really quickly to get each one "going". The first puppy, a bitch, was very small - only 7 ozs. she had a red patch over one eye but only half a patch over the other - white ears and no body patches. The second puppy, another bitch, had red ears but no eye patches and no body patches, she was also very small. Next another bitch with correct head markings and one body patch. Two dogs came next with good head markings and better body patches - each puppy a little bigger than the one before. COPPERMOOR CLOVER was the sixth puppy - she was twice the size of the first and again had even more patches. The last puppy COPPERMOOR CATKIN was small again and took a lot of reviving, I nearly gave up on her, but she tried so hard to live and once she "got going" soon caught the others up. This whelping took three and a half hours, but it seemed infinitely longer. Still Pebble would not settle with her puppies - every time they got near to her, she stood up and moved to the other side of the box - this unsatisfactory situation went on until the vet came and "gave her a shot", within an hour she "pulled herself together" and I finally tucked them all up for the night - 20 puppies - 13 Reds and 7 Red and Whites.

The funny thing about Red and White pups is that their bright pink noses, feet and ears and the "pinkiness" of their white skin generally, gives them the appearance of translucent worms! While the Reds are more like sober, chocolate sausages, who oozed well-being, warm, comfortable, full tums and delicious milky dreams. The Red and Whites squirmed and squeaked merrily - they were much more active than any newborn litter I have seen, except John and Mary Blackwell's CHARNBOROUGH litter which were rushing about at one day old!

In spite of my most determined efforts, however, the first two puppies just got weaker and bluer and died after two days. I was not very sad as I should really have culled them - being mismarked. Pebble became more and more interested as the days went on and polished her puppies nearly as much as Belle. She did not keep quite the class of establishment as Belle, but her pups grew bigger and fatter, faster. Belle had lost one of her puppies which made her litter 12. So on the day Pebble reduced hers to four, by treading on a dog puppy (oh! she was so ashamed), I decided to give Pebble four of Belles and even out the load.

They were about 10 days old now and the mums were leaving them for a little longer. Incidentally the two litters were in different rooms, Belle and Pebble never met while they were indoors with their puppies, except once. They came face to face accidentally - they "hackled up" and rushed back to their babies. We were very careful it never happened again. One day when Belle was out for a minute I "snaffled" the four dog pups, when she came back she counted the remainder, had a quick look round and settled down with an "Oh well. Easy come easy go" shrug. When Pebble went out minutes later, I put the four Red dogs underneath the Red and Whites and mixed them well to transfer the scent. Pebble came back, counted the puppies, looked slightly surprised that the number had doubled, thought the new ones to be dirty and undernourished so fed and polished them and settled down with a sigh. Two bitches with eight puppies each.

So they continued until, fully weaned and escaping from their whelping boxes, the two litters were taken out into the barn, to live together in the puppy house there. Belle and Pebble thankfully resumed residence in their own kennel together leaving me to carry on their good work of cleaning and polishing pups.

Clover, the biggest Red and White, continued to be the biggest. The biggest of the two litters. Comfrey (called Bridie and living with the Ackroydes near Ludlow) was always the smallest

of the two litters. The Reds continued to be very even, more or less the same size and hardly distinguishable from each other. Comfrey was the very cleverest of all the puppies and was the real leader. Being very clever she always came off best in any situation.

So many, many generations of Reds have been bred to a set type - a show standard, while the Red and Whites have travelled another road. I think this shows when they are born and I will always remember with pleasure and intrigue, the time I had the two litters at the same time.

Would recipients please note that two spelling mistakes have somehow crept into the pedigree of MEIKLERED HI-WAYMAN on the last page of the issue.

MOANRUAD is the accepted spelling, not MONRUAD. It occurs nine times.

MONRUAD AMERIGO should be MOANRUAD AMERILO.

It is the Scottish version of the name that is spelt Monroe or Munro, or Monro or Munroe; and they all mean the red peat bog.

HOLLY'S FIRST SEASON

We thought we would write a bit about Holly's season as we felt it was very unusual. We have never experienced anything like it with any of our other bitches and that it may be of help to other Red and White owners who may experience the same problem.

We first noticed she had started her season with a very pale, very slight discharge and we emphasize slight. No swelling at all. We were a little suspicious that something was happening to her because at two shows the week previously when the judge went to her rear end, she backed off and sat down and in one instance she actually cried out.

This was completely out of character for her. We experimented with her at home and sure enough when we went to touch her rear end she backed off and cried, also on several occasions she would turn and look at herself. Because of this we were not really surprised with the future happenings. After two days the discharge stopped and her vulva swelled considerably. There was no sign of any discharge or colour. We experimented with our dogs to see if she interested them, nothing, not even slightly. This went on for 12 days. As she was entered For Leicester, Elaine took her as we considered it to be safe. Then another surprise, within two hours of leaving home the discharge had started again, it was profuse, heavily coloured and the poor dogs in the car with her were starting to get the message fast. She then stayed like this losing very heavily for 10 days; on that day she was a little off colour so we investigated again and found that the horns to the uterus were very swollen and hard.

Off she went to the vet who was very surprised and said it could be an infection but she had no temperature. He put her on antibiotics as a precaution. Another week passed and the discharge stopped. She was still very swollen and the dogs were ignoring her but she was developing milk. Back to the vet who could not explain why it has happened and he said to be extra careful with her. She should have some more antibiotics and to watch the milk.

Her vulva is very slowly going back to a more normal size. She has been to a show and let the judge touch her rear end and we can now touch her without any bother. I took the precaution of taking her back to the vet yesterday as I had to take one of my Reds; the appointment was with a very experienced vet where dogs are concerned. He was baffled and said he had never heard of anything like it, especially with a first season but that in veterinary practice he learns something new every day. He said to just forget about it, do not worry about infections and things as she is obviously perfectly fit. When she has her next season he will be very interested to know if it is normal, He predicts it will be but he could not begin to explain the milk developing at such an early state in her season.

The funny thing is her little sister Clover started her season about the same time and that she also had a peculiar one. She too has taken a long time to go back to her normal size.

The '1944' Breed Standard

I was very interested to read Mrs. Blackwell's contribution to last month's Newsletter concerning the Breed Standard and found the 'Points' allocation of particular interest to me because I had not seen that part of the old Standard before.

Mrs. Blackwell is quite correct, the Standard which she reproduced was the Standard of the Irish Red & White Setter Society which was formed in 1944 of which Mrs. Cuddy still holds all the books, records, Trophies, etc., etc.

Further details of this Society appear in Mrs. Redlich's book "The Dogs of Ireland" which was published in Dundalk, in 1949. The frontpiece was the bitch (Wh.) JUDITH CUNNINGHAM OF KNOCKALLA. Unfortunately my copy of the book has a very poor reproduction of the picture of this bitch. Mrs. Cuddy herself obtained her information for the section on IRW from Mrs. Cuddy herself who has now been involved with, either directly or indirectly, IRW for nearly fifty years. Mrs. Cuddy tells me that she learnt of this type of Irish Setter from the Rev. R. Houston whose breeding went back to the last century and the old Rossmore Kennels of Irish Red & Whites.

The section III Points of the Irish Red & White Setter in Mrs. Redlich's book is as reproduced by Mrs. Blackwell (except that Mrs. Redlich did not include the 'points') and I think that the preceding section of the book II TYPE AND TEMPERAMENT is also worth reproducing:-

II TYPE AND TEMPERAMENT

The objects of the Irish Red & White Setter Society are:

- a) To encourage the working qualities of the breed in every possible way.
- b) To promote the breeding of them upon sound working principles.
- c) To ensure that, if they are classified at Shows, they be judged from a working standpoint.

This extract from the Rules and Constitution of the Red & White Setter Society in itself gives a picture of what is looked for in the Red & White Setter, which true to its tradition is still solely bred for its usefulness in the field. Under the rules of the Irish Kennel Club a Red & White Setter shall not be entitled to be styled a Champion unless, in addition to the wins at Shows, he has acquired the necessary points at a Field Trial held under the Rules and licence of the Irish Kennel Club.

Room for brains has not been restricted to ensure narrowness of skull and badly balanced dogs are rare in a breed which has not developed a craze for gigantic or lilliputian dimensions.

But all was apparent negligence of what are often determined as the "finer points" of a breed does not prevent the Red & White Setter from being handsome as well as useful, combining dash and spirit with gentleness as well as being healthy and free from the vices and ailments which form the unsavoury attributes of animals destined solely for success on the bench.

The bitches make good mothers and are prolific whelpers, as has lately been proved by Jennifer of Knockalla, who presented her mistress with a litter of nineteen puppies without any apparent exertion.

Like most gun dogs they make reliable nursemaids for youngsters of all ages and splendid companions for those past the nursery stage. Verily the breed may well stand for the personification of the old saying "handsome is as handsome does".

The following "Points of the Irish Red & White Setter" represent the authorised description of the breed.

U.K. FIELD TRIALS - SEPTEMBER 1983

These Trials were run, as is usual, in the Newmarket area and I was able to attend all Stakes except two. No other IRW owner attended which was a great pity because although on the whole the dog work was held to be poor the atmosphere and weather was good which made for a pleasant outing. Most of the Stakes were complete by lunch-time each day so everyone was able to head for home at a reasonable hour.

There were no awards made in any of the Puppy and Non winner Stakes. I believe that the All Aged Stake run by the Gordon Setter Club had some awards but as luck would have it I was unable to attend that day. The final Trial of the year was run by the ISAE and the Setter & Pointer Club and the winner of the All Aged Stake was Mr. P. McCabe's IRS dog, FT. Ch. RED FERGUS - rather appropriate that it should have been an Irish Setter since it was the 75th Anniversary of the ISAE.

'Fergus' is of special interest to IRW owners since his sire is FT Ch. GLENSIDE RED HUGH who, in a R x R mating sired the white Irish bitch, JUNO of ASSARTS. Juno has won awards in Novice Trials and I understand that she is the bitch to whom Mrs. Roslyn Williams referred in her notes as being a very good IRW but registered as Red. Juno's owners also have the white Gordon Setter FT Ch. FREEBIRCH VINCENT - it seems they go in for oddities!!

RARE BREEDS SYMPOSIUM
SUNDAY, 2ND OCTOBER 1983
COOMBE PARK, COVENTRY

I did not quite know what to expect when Ann Millington and I set out for Coombe Park as apart from knowing the Symposium was taking place and how much the tickets were, very little information had been forthcoming.

Unfortunately I had a mental block and as we approached the end of the M6, I could not remember which exit to take. Ann was no help either! Hence we were a little late in arriving.

As Maurice and Murphy were the first to take the stage we missed them. Maurice did give us a short history of what he said about the Red and Whites such as "Please judges, judge them as a separate breed, not as a Red with white patches". He also mentioned one or two faults in the breed, anyway we will not dwell on our dogs as we, as owners, surely know the faults.

I found, as the Symposium unfolded, just how dedicated a lot of people are to their particular chosen rare breed. A lot of the representatives of their respective breeds were very honest about their particular breed's faults. They even used different dogs of the same breed to point out the faults. They pleaded with prospective judges, who they hoped were present (and quite a few were), not to place poor specimens as this they felt would not help a rare breed in future. Many were not happy about having to use closely related animals, especially when it came to faults like bad mouths and wrong colouring in their breed. They thought that prospective breeders should be very selective even to the point of being ruthless because if you do not get it right in the beginning, with few animals to choose from in your breeding programme in future, you could have a lot of problems. Quite a few representatives of the various breeds produced leaflets with a breed standard and a short history which was a very good idea.

I felt it was a great pity that there was only three of us from the Red and Whites that went to the Symposium, well, two really, as Maurice went with Murphy to represent us. When Ann and I spoke to different people during the intervals and lunch, they all said what a charming breed ours was and that we should not let them be spoilt by trying not to breed them too big and not to make them an epitome of the Reds. I learnt quite a lot on that day and I know Ann feels the same. It was well worth the £2.00 for a very full and enjoyable day.
