Report on Club business from the Membership Liaison Officer

June 2013

Chairman Bob Knapton has stood down for health reasons. The Committee wishes him well for a speedy recovery. Shelagh Walton will be Acting Chairwoman and Graham Bayne will be Vice-Chairman. One or possibly two members will be co-opted to serve to the next AGM.

The General Committee will meet on Sunday 22nd September, Sunday 5 January 2014 and on the morning of the AGM on Sunday 14th April 2014 at Newton Regis Village Hall. Members wishing to raise issues for the Committee should contact the Secretary, preferably two weeks before.

Club funds are currently in a healthy state but there are concerns about the steeply rising costs of printing and postage. Attention will be given to move most Club Communications to email and the GB web site.

Discussions are in hand with the Kennel Club about the re-allocation of the set of Challenge Certificates from the deregistering of the Scottish Breed Club to a general Championship show.

The working Sub-Committee is being encouraged to link with other Setter and Pointer Clubs for training activities.

Five IRWS have been placed in new homes recently by Club Rescue. One 3 year old male seeks a home – details on the GB website. The General Committee will address policy and operational issues of Rescue at its next meeting.

The research project on Posterior Polar Cataract at the Animal Health trust has reached an important step. The desired number of DNA samples has been attained and it is expected that the whole genome for the breed will be produced this summer. The next task will be to derive a DNA marker test.

The Kennel Club has confirmed that Assured Breeders will not be in breach of the ABS conditions if they use one dog in a mating which is affected with PPC.

The Genetic Sub-Committee has devised and piloted a general health survey which will be made available shortly to owners in the UK and overseas. Analysis of the returns will be carried out by and epidemiologist. Reports will be produced on national and global bases. The Kennel Club and the AHT have invited the Club to join in a survey of bloat in Irish Setters. This is described on the ISBC web site at <http://www.isbc.org.uk> IRWS Owners will be contacted by the Kennel Club later this summer.

Martin Rowles has been co-opted to the Genetic Sub Committee. The health pages on the GB Club web site will be updated this summer. The Club Championship Show was held on 16th June 2013 at a new venue, The Kennel Club Building at Stoneleigh Park near Coventry, and was viewed as successful apart from the car parking. Before confirming the same venue for the 2014 show, the Committee wish to have the reactions of members. It is likely that the date of the Championship show in 2014 will be moved from its original date 22nd June to avoid a clash with gundog day at Blackpool on that same weekend.

A Sub Committee is considering the form of Celebrations for the Club's 30th Anniversary in 2014, possibly to be held in conjunction with the Championship show.

The General Committee received a paper analysing the current judging lists and the number of specialist judges at open shows over the last 7 years, some 16% of the total. These data suggest that more effort needs to be put into developing specialist judges on the C and B lists and into encouraging more exhibitors to support them with entries. The judge's Sub- Committee has selected judges for the Clubs' open shows as follows:

March 2014: Mrs Shelagh Walton (Gallybob)

October 2014: Miss Roxanne McDonald (Roanjora)

March 2015: Mrs Jinty Gill-Davies (Rosecourt)

October 2015: Mr Ian Lamb (Casafelice)

The selection of a judge for the Club Championship Show in 2015 will be announced when formalities have been concluded.

These included all Vulnerable Native Breeds, High profile breeds, Crufts Group Winners 2013, owners of previous winners of Best in Show at Crufts and various other personalities from the world of dogs – including our very own Crufts commentator Clare Balding and Marc 'The Vet' Abrahams. Participants were invited to obtain a minimum

sponsorship of £100 and there were also other fundraising activities including a very brave lady, Kim Culyer-Dawson, who had her head shaved (that raised in excess of £600.) Various General Championship Shows also made generous donations and Windsor Dog show organised their own version of the Great British Bake Off with Lemon Drizzle Cake baked by 10 'celebrities' of the dog world, which were subsequently auctioned.

We were delighted to be invited to represent Irish Red & White Setters (as a Vulnerable Native Breed) it was hoped to have at least one IRWS walking each day, but sadly despite numerous requests on FB, that did not materialise. Our allotted day was Tuesday 11th June 2013 and we set about raising our sponsorship monies. Thanks to the generosity of friends and LKA committee members I was able to raise £200. The funds raised on Jilly's Jolly Jaunt are to be split between Great Ormond Street Hospital and Doglost UK being close to all our hearts following the disappearance of Gaye O'Connor's Mabel and Winnie in March of this year. TWO IMPORTANT ADVICE /INFORMATIONS

It is five years since we ran a survey into the effect of inbreeding in the breed and this year we will run a survey into the General Health of the breed. This will take place between

September 9th and September 30th 2013 and will be International with the co-operation of overseas IRWS Breed Clubs and individuals.

Accompanying this Newsletter you should find the survey questionnaire and help to complete it. It is open to all IRWS owners and will also be available and completable on-line. The survey is simple and quick to complete but the information on breed health and ill-health is absolutely vital to keep the breed as healthy as possible, so we need to know about dogs *without* problems as well as those *with* problems to keep everything in context.

The information gathered in the survey will be entirely *confidential* and no dog's names will ever be published – we do not ask for owners names but do not mind if you want to add yours should you want to contact me about your dog. We do ask for sire and dam so that if there could be a hereditary link, it could be followed up. Information will be added to the database, if it is not already there. Do not worry if you do not know your dog's Co-efficient of Inbreeding (COI) – it is already in the database.

Please keep your survey questionnaire in a safe place and copy it for as many dogs as you have – we will be reminding you regularly until the end of September. The KC is helping with the distribution of our survey and may contact you as well.

Irish Setters are working with the AHT and KC to research the scourge of BLOAT and ask the other Setter breeds to help too. We have agreed to join in although we do not have many bloat reports in our database – but if we can be of help to a fellow setter breed then why not?

The KC will distribute the Bloat Questionnaire to IRWS owners as well as Irish, English and Gordon Setters, and of course we will be kept informed of the progress of the research.

I don't know which survey will come to you first, but by the end you will be an expert in form filling! It's not a chore really, but so very very important if you value the health of the breed

SHOULD WE BREED WITH PPC AFFECTED IRWS?

The answer to this question is **YES** but only if all your other considerations for breeding partners are met.

When PPC was first discovered in 1995 we expected problems with blindness, and there was a genuine concern for the welfare of the breed. Responsible breeders withdrew their affected dogs from the breeding pool in a commendable effort to reduce the incidence of this hereditary cataract – a public spirited and voluntary action. Great efforts have been made in the intervening years by the Club and members to research the problem. We have all learned much about PPC and its implications through our experiences and observations and in consultation with greatly respected people in the field of canine ophthalmology feel that now is the time to present these facts.

As far as can be possibly ascertained, PPC has little effect upon the dog – the cataract can only be seen by clinical examination, it is not life threatening; it does not cause suffering; the dog does not seem to be aware of it; it has not caused blindness, and the dog's vision does not appear to be impaired. We are informed that PPC in IRWS is a **low category condition** and that simply withdrawing PPC dogs from breeding, that are otherwise worth of merit, adds extra problems to the dangerously small gene pool. ***Sadly, too many good dogs have been lost to the breed, simply because of PPC, in favour of dogs with other, potentially more serious issues.***

Is it not time now, with benefit of experience, backed by more advanced knowledge, to see PPC in perspective? Make up your own mind, resist peer pressure and what 'people will say' and weigh up the complimenting points of both prospective partners, with PPC in its proper place in the scheme of things.

Of course no one with any intelligence and love of the breed would deliberately mate two affected dogs together – that would be stupidity in the extreme!

Should we breed with PPC affected IRWS? **YES**, if they are good enough and fit all the criteria we deem important in our breeding programmes.

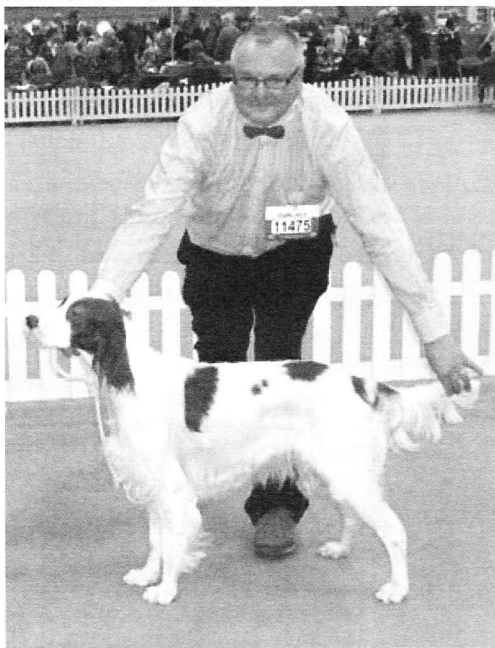

TAKING YOUR DOG ABROAD (THE PET TRAVEL SCHEME)

The Pet Travel Scheme (PETS) has been a notable success, allowing may thousands of British dogs to travel abroad since the scheme began. However, although the scheme requires vaccination against rabies, it does mean that our dogs may now face other new diseases against which they have little defence.

The new travel rules (1st January 2012) significantly simplify and shorten the preparations needed for taking your dog abroad, and some of us may not know how to go about it.

Firstly it is wise to discuss your plans with your veterinary surgeon in advance, about 2 months before PETS qualifying countries and 6 months before travel outside these countries.

All travellers should contact the PETS helpline to obtain a factsheet. The PETS travel scheme still requires a number of conditions to be met before you actually travel. You can visit the DEFRA website for the very latest information on PETS, or call their hotline on 0870 241 1710.

A travel check list for dogs travelling to other EU Member states and PETS approved non –EU countries and permit entry into the UK Your dog will need to be Microchipped, and should have a current certificate of vaccination against rabies. You will also need an EU Pet Passport or Official Veterinary Health Certificate from your vet certifying the microchip and vaccination. You will also need to have had your dog wormed and deflead before travel.

Continental ticks and other parasites prevalent abroad carry a range of potentially serious and fatal diseases unfamiliar to British dogs, so you will need to discuss the most appropriate preventative measures for the country you are travelling to with your vet.

There is usually a small booklet available from your vet for you to read before embarking on your choice of travel. Happy Holidays!
